What's your Career IQ?

- Assist with identifying potential industries and environments suited to your interests
- Familiarize yourself with roles that may be new to you or emerging within the world of work
- Improve your chances for targeting and obtaining meaningful work in any job market

- The future trends (including labour market trends) relevant to the career

Informational Interviewing

- The technique of informational interviewing will give you an opportunity to learn from others who are already on a career path. Professional Connections & Social Media Networking

- There are valuable opportunities to participate in or join professional associations and organizations where you can meet and learn from others working in or interested in a specific career path. By familiarizing yourself with industry events, association websites and social media groups (e.g. LinkedIn), you can obtain easy access to valuable information and potential opportunities related to your field of interest.

Education and Training

- During your career research process, you may discover that you require additional or specific training and education to qualify to work in a target role. The sooner you learn about your options, the sooner you can begin preparing to position yourself to qualify for entry into your chose career.

Strategic Volunteering and Job Shadowing

- There’s no substitute for taking the time to try out a job or a set of skills. The value of volunteering within your field of interest or job shadowing a professional in your target career cannot be measured. It is important to be strategic and targeted as you pursue these activities so that you know what you are hoping to gain specifically from the experience. By clarifying your goals and defining your availability in advance, you can ensure that you gain the most value from these activities.
